# **Committee Reports**

## Education

Letourneau reported that the committee met and decided there was enough enrollment to retain all instructors.

#### **Finance**

Lamb noted a Special Meeting was held May 8. Lamb asked Oyama 1) what is the money going to be spent on (the balance from the money transferred per the May 8 meeting) and 2) Are you going to pay the para that does the management positions the extra stipend?

#### PARA

Oyama would like to pay the para the \$2,500 stipend at the beginning of the school year. Oyama discussed with the Union what the stipend is actually for; it is not for any instruction. The para's added responsibilities are financial.

Corcoran moved and Letourneau seconded a motion to go with Oyama's recommendation to pay the para the stipend. All were in favor.

 There was discussion as to the nature of stipends, job descriptions, opening contracts, ESPs and CDC contracts. Consensus was that yearly stipends were not the best way; it should be included in the person's salary and not be viewed or treated as a "gift". The issue was how to solve the issue tonight.

Harrington moved and Corcoran seconded a motion to direct Administration to sit down with the appropriate parties and reopen that section of the contract for the following years. All were in favor.

# Superintendent's Report

Knapp reported that we are without both a Commissioner and a Deputy Commissioner Education. Commissioner Cate resigned this past Friday. The State Board will be meeting in Manchester tomorrow and he will attempt to attend. The Legislature has been looking at restructuring the position, with the Governor having direct authority over the new Commissioner. Currently, the Commissioner position is appointed by and reports to the State Board of Education.

Cate had been working with the Superintendents and the Business Education Alliance, which proposed that the State Board as known now be done away with and a new Board, composed of educators and business people rather than governor appointees, take its place. This was recommended to the Legislature. The Board of Education is only ok with the restructuring of the Commissioner position if a new Board, as per the Business Education Alliances proposal, is also named. The current Board does not have much power, being appointees. Governor Douglas will be in town later this month and Knapp will try to meet with him at the CDC.

 Knapp brought up the need to enter Executive Session this evening to discuss some of the specifics regarding the Director Search. Four candidates were brought in; two will be brought to the Board. There will be a Search Committee meeting later this week. Being that the Session would be advisory, Lamb recommended that it be held at the end of the meeting.

# **Chairman's Report**

Lamb expressed his delight at the excellent Board workshop recently put on by Laura Sorris of the Vermont School Boards Association. Lamb noted some ideas that he picked up at the training:

- → The recommendation of changing Auditors every two-to-three years.
- → The recommendation that the Board meet with the Auditors as a board.
- → That the Auditors review any issues that may present financial jeopardy to the school district.

Lamb also spoke of the *Role of the School Board* document that had been distributed earlier in a board Packet. Lamb will start asking at future meetings what each Board member's

Vision is for the school district. Getting out into the community and getting countywide feedback as to what the Board should be doing is vital. This will help with budgets, build stronger collaborative relationships with all the school districts in the county, and provide accountability to the community.

Lamb requested Administration present state and local assessments for students for our school at the June meeting. Lamb also asked for the summary of NEASC evaluations and the Board's evaluations. These items should be reviewed annually. Knapp expressed that what CDC has with its placement and five-year reports is more relevant and meaningful then the SVSU State of the District Report.

### **Director's Report:**

Oyama reminded everyone that in the Program of Studies, each Program states where students get jobs and go on to further training. Oyama then reported that:

- → The five-year Perkins Grant is in a transition year. The Board will need a special session to approve the Grant. The Grant has just been received and there are only several weeks before it is due.
- → On May 23 there will be an in-service day. The Annual Community Appreciation Breakfast will be at 7AM. Following the Breakfast, teachers will be meeting with their Advisory Committees and the afternoon will be spent on NEASC report.
- → On May 8, CDC provided space for the Transition Fair in the Atrium and Assembly room. The Fair was for all students, giving information about transitioning from high school to post secondary education.
- → May field trips included DECA going to Atlanta for a training session and Cosmetology going to NYC. There were also several in-state and one day, out-ofstate events students attended.
- → FBLA and SkillsUSA first place winners will be going to National Competitions; FBLA will be in Atlanta and SkillsUSA in Kansas City.
- → Theatre Arts presented two plays, *The Man Who Came to Dinner* and *You Can't Take It with You.*
- → On May 22, CDC along with Workforce Development Partnership, BCIC and the Department of Labor will be hosting a Job Fair in the Atrium between 1-5PM. The public is invited to attend.
- → On May 30, Forestry will be hosting the Game of Logging at Colgate Park on Route 9W. FBLA will be manning a concession stand at the event as a fundraiser for their conference in June.
- → On June 3 at 7PM, Sacred Heart St Francis de Sales Parish Center will be the site of the Annual Outstanding Student Recognition Night. Guest speaker will be Bob Stannard, former director of BBC.

Montgomery reported on the recent Ford competition in New Hampshire that two Auto Program students participated in. The students prepped for several days on a rental car but it had the wrong engine. Bob offered his thanks to Scott Mazda and Joe Beatty for providing the students with the correct vehicle. The CDC placed sixth out of twenty teams. Both of the student's parents attended and both students got to ride in Porsches around the track!
